Churchyard Matters

Everton and Gamlingay are in slightly different situations regarding the grounds around the churches, but there is opportunity to work together on conservation management of the grass. Hatley, like Everton, is

under PCC responsibility including the open churchyard at St. Denis (but not the building). As St. Denis churchyard is a designated nature reserve, there is a voluntary management group that looks after it in practice. In Everton this is up to the PCC directly but in Gamlingay, where the churchyard is closed, the local council has upkeep responsibility and it is important that plans are made collaboratively. In both cases significant changes are under the control of the DAC and the Chancellor. In Everton there is a conservation plan for the churchyard and new burial ground adjacent. We intend to provide regular updates on our churchyards, including information on interesting wild flowers. Everton has some lovely meadow saxifrage doing particularly well this year as the grass has not been cut. Any pictures or offers of help are welcome. Here is one:

Life in Hatleys during the last several weeks has certainly proved that the community spirit is alive and well. Those of us who are 'old and vulnerable' have been contacted by many kind people with offers to help with shopping, errands, loneliness etc. We have been well cared for - thank you everyone. The road through Hatley St. George was initially much quieter which was great (busier now) but farm traffic was very active initially with 'catch up' on the land after a very wet spell (easily forgotten now). This, at least, made life seem more normal as we all adjusted to our new way of life. There were less cars but many more cyclists and walkers taking advantage of the fine weather and not being at work. Many have stopped in the Churchyard opposite our house to sit, picnic or just gaze - good to see that the Churchyard has been appreciated while the Church has had to be locked. The footpaths have been much busier but there is plenty of room to socially distance. Walking round the Hatley Estate this spring has been particularly beautiful – maybe the weather - clear blue skies, sun and wonderful colours with the trees, hedges and flowers all coming out. The cowslips seemed particularly abundant this year as were the bluebells and celandines in Buff Wood. On a recent walk I spotted (with binoculars) a vixen with cubs, five hares in one field and then a muntjac jumped across the path just in front of me. Later that week I saw a badger out in broad day light which seemed strange. Sadly no swallows this year at Church Farm which is unusual and we have not heard the cuckoo here but despite all it has been a glorious and memorable Spring.
