From Hilary:

Schools have finished and we are into the high holiday season. Our thoughts and prayers are with those who care for and support our young people during vacation time.

I have been much engaged recently in discussions about churchyards, their use and care. Circumstances vary considerably around the parishes as to the issues and who they affect so I thought this might be an opportunity to share some information. It turns out that one person's wildflowers are another person's uncared-for mess. I am proud that our PCCs continue to work to care for the environment and wildlife in all our churches and I encourage anyone who hears complaints to send them my way, as these are usually the result of not understanding the issues and can sometimes be turned round to support, once people 'get' what is being done and why.

In Gamlingay the parish church (parish priest and PCC) has no responsibility for any current burial sites - the two cemeteries are owned and administered by the Parish Council. As many will know, the churchyard around St Mary the Virgin has been 'closed' which means that no more burials can take place, and although the church retains ecclesiastical responsibility (so remains responsible and subject to faculty regulations for what happens) the Council has practical and financial responsibility for maintenance. The current work in progress, which is to have Gamlingay churchyard managed in a wildlife and planet-friendly way, has been chosen by the PCC as part of our collective human responsibility to reduce carbon emissions. The PCC has, as part of this, chosen to apply for an award for this work. Alec Hissett has taken on the lead role for the church and will report on what it entails, and the progress being made. Leaving grass to grow until hay time and cutting and completely removing the remains, as well as having a compost heap, are two elements that the tidy-minded might not enjoy. Negotiations are ongoing with the Council to integrate their mowing contracts with the plan, which is to maintain the churchyard appropriately for both wildlife and community. The recent scything course has resulted in a part-cut, and three or four people are now trained and tooled up to hand mow. More work is planned - Hilary and Alec would love to hear from anyone wanting to join the action team.

In Everton the old churchyard is still open for burials, nearly full but with the new extension available and likely soon to be needed again after its first use a few years ago. Both areas are the responsibility of the PCC. The old churchyard is already a designated wildflower area and has been so for several years. As such it has been subject to a mowing regime to preserve the flower habitat. Through lockdown and since then, plans have not been adhered to fully due to a lack of personnel, though with much gratitude to those who have done their best to keep some semblance of tidiness. This last year people who visit graves of relatives have become very dissatisfied with how overgrown the area has become, and a new energy is there to keep the place tidy (see below). This is much appreciated but needs coordinating to maintain the wildflowers. An action team is being gathered, coordinated by Hilary and Jane Butcher. The PCC has agreed to look at applying for the same award as Gamlingay and has the active commitment of the local school to share in the management of the area for wildlife.

At Hatley St George the (open) churchyard has no burial records and is generously maintained by the goodwill and efforts of the Aster Estate. Most of the churchyard is close mown, but an area behind the church is managed for wildflowers, and the churchyard has wild areas around the edges, including water, and could easily qualify for the award the parish churches are seeking if applied for.

East Hatley St Denis Churchyard is an odd anomaly in church terms, in being open for burials and therefore the responsibility of Gamlingay with the Hatleys PCC, but a council-designated wildlife reserve surrounding a redundant church in the care of the Friends of Friendless Churches. A group of dedicated and knowledgeable volunteers keeps connection with the PCC through Hilary, Nicola Jenkins being a leader in this work. The churchyard is managed for wildflowers and public access and amenity.

NEWS FROM GAMLINGAY

The August sessions will be Tuesdays 8th and 28th, and although everyone is welcome, special effort will be made to make those with memory loss and their carers comfortable.

Special thanks to Jane Butcher and the people who came to help to make a big difference in less-than-ideal weather conditions. As explained above, there is a lot more to do, particularly to regain the wildflower management programme - which means a lot of raking of cut grass.
