There continues to be concern about people missing information which has been in the Newsletter and wondering if there is a better way to convey that information. The truth is that people don't always listen to or read regular information, and when things are missed the tendency is to blame the information givers rather than taking personal responsibility for finding things out. Disseminating information is time-consuming, we do our best! Current practice reflects the time and expertise available; we are always open to suggestions and in particular any that come with help to make them work! We are working on our social media and internet presence and thank those who see to what we currently do.

Bats! A bat count at St Denis church in East Hatley has been going on for a while. Rachel Bates for the Bat Conservation Council was present on Sunday night for an 'open meeting' counting emerging Brown Long-Eared bats - a rarer species that use the church as a nursery roost. Most of us counted a few passing pipistrelle bats as well by mistake! The official number of the Brown Long Eared bats was 20 and those present had the fun of using bat monitors to hear the different sounds not detectable by the human ear.

Rachel wrote about St Denis (Sunday was the third visit)......

This years' monitoring (my visits) has the following species list:

- Brown Long-eared (roosting)
- Common Pipistrelle (all three visits)
- Soprano Pipistrelle (all three visits)
- Nathusius Pipistrelle (first visit)
- Barbastelle (all three visits)
- Noctule (second and third visit)
- Serotine (third visit)
